- A motion to accept the minutes from the Annual Meeting on February 10, 2024, was made by Mindy Belcher.
- The motion was seconded by Carter Booth.
- The minutes from the Annual Meeting on February 10, 2024, were approved.

**Reports**

**President's Report**

- Kind words were shared about Bonnie Bradley, a longtime volunteer who passed away earlier this year.
- 2024 was the 99<sup>th</sup> year of operation of the Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden as a non-profit organization.
- Many major things were accomplished in 2024.
  - Educational opportunities were provided to the community in a variety of different ways.
  - The Seabury Society for the Preservation of the Glebe House, Inc. became the official owner of the Glebe House and the Triangle Properties, which were donated by the Episcopal Church in Connecticut.
    - This change in ownership will be helpful when applying for grants and other funding.
    - Thank you to Reverend Tuesday for facilitating this donation process.

- New roofs were put on the Glebe House, the cottage, and the garage.
  - The roof project was completed with the help of many people, including Board members and the community.
  - An especially big thank you goes to Guy Gabrielson and his Foundation for supporting this project.
  - Those who came to our fundraisers showed how important the Glebe House is to the community.
  - The roof project was completed just before the torrential rain storm and flooding on August 18-19, 2024.
  - The new roofs will last a long time. Thank you to all for your support with this project.
- There were revenue increases in 2024. It was a banner year, and the numbers look very healthy.
- The 100<sup>th</sup> Year Anniversary Committee has been working throughout the year to organize a wonderful event.
- 2024 was the first full year where self-guided tours were available. These tours were very well received. The self-guided tours provide our visitors with flexibility regarding the length of their tour. Visitors may stay for a longer self-guided tour or they may opt for a shorter tour, depending on their needs and schedule.
- The Property Committee worked on the roof project.
- The Garden Committee worked on the 3<sup>rd</sup> year of the garden restoration project.
- We are very fortunate to have Lois Zane at the Glebe House. She spends much of her time on caring for the Glebe House and the Collection. She has great knowledge and commitment. Lois is very dedicated, and we are lucky to have her.
- LoriAnn Witte, the Glebe House Museum Director, brings a wonderful skill set to the Glebe House. She is affable and dedicated. LoriAnn is involved in many community events where she has her Glebe House hat on. She is an ambassador for our organization, and our organization is so fortunate to have LoriAnn.

## Director's Report

- It was a great year in 2024. We had the highest amount of revenue in 28 years.
- Museum Makeover
  - The museum makeover was well received by both docents and visitors.
  - Visitors are now able to take self-guided tours as a result of the museum makeover.
  - Visitation was down a little bit due to the roof construction project, but it was still an incredible year.
  - Many of the docents used the new information panels as reference points during house tours.
  - The docents have been very adaptable in using these new panels.
  - Thank you to our dedicated docents for sharing the Glebe House story with our visitors.
- Community Participation
  - Our involvement with local organizations shows the community that we are willing to collaborate.
  - Some of the organizations that we have worked with include the Woodbury, CT Chamber of Commerce, the Institute for American Indian Studies, and Connecticut Historic Gardens.
  - People are generous towards the Glebe House.
- Quit Claim
  - We have been working to transfer the Glebe House and Triangle Properties to the Seabury Society for the Preservation of the Glebe House, Inc. for a very long time.
  - This transfer finally happened in March, 2024.
  - A big thank you goes to Bishop Jeffrey Mello, Reverend Tuesday Rupp, and Attorney Brad Babbitt, who facilitated this transfer.
  - Our thanks and appreciation also go to Attorney Fran Donnarumma who did pro bono work.
  - The only cost was legal fees. Thank you to the Board of Directors.
- Roof Replacement
  - The Seabury Society acquired a \$10,000 grant from the 1772 Foundation for our roof replacement project.
  - The Gabrielson Fund also provided a generous donation, which helped with the roof replacement for the Glebe House Museum, the cottage, and the garage.
  - Thank you to Puttin' on the Roof attendees for their support of the roof replacement project.
  - All three roofs have been completed, and the cost has been covered for all three roofs.
- Gertrude Jekyll Garden Restoration

- 2024 marked the third year of the five-year garden restoration project.
- Roof construction materials around the house made garden work challenging.
- There were also weather challenges. It was very hot, humid, and dry.
- There were watering system challenges.
- Our passionate and dedicated garden volunteers changed their plans as needed so that they could do their work.
- The gardeners worked hard on weeding, which was especially needed because the garden is still young.
- We have an anonymous donor, our "Garden Angel," who is generously providing funding for the 5-year restoration project. The anonymous donor made a 2024 donation towards yearly expenses so that the garden can continue to thrive as Gertrude Jekyll intended. \$10,000 is in that account at this time.
- Education Programs
  - Julie Gilligan helps with the education planning and attends all of the planning meetings. Julie filled in for LoriAnn at the Christmas Festival.
  - Marshall Children Program
    - This program shows how important our story is to the community.
    - The same children come back year after year. We also attract new students.
    - Some children age out of the program.
      - We have high school students who started in the program when they were seven years old.
      - These students now participate in special events (All Hollows and summer camp).
      - These students love the Marshall story and enjoy sharing their knowledge.
    - The revenue brought in by the Marshall Children Program grew in 2024.
- Grants and Sponsorships
  - We have a lot of organizations and individual donors to thank for their support.
  - Those organizations are listed in the Annual Report.
- Retirement
  - Bonnie Bradley, in memoriam
    - Volunteer Bonnie Bradley passed away earlier this year. She retired from the Glebe House last year and moved to Tennessee to be closer to family.
    - Bonnie was one of the first volunteers that LoriAnn met, and she offered her help to LoriAnn.
    - Bonnie was spunky, sassy, kind, and generous. She was a docent, and she also volunteered for many other things.
    - Bonnie was very engaging with visitors on tours.
    - Bonnie loved colonial architecture.

- LoriAnn is glad we have so many memories that Bonnie leaves behind. Bonnie will not be forgotten.
  - The Glebe House will send a basket of flowers for Bonnie's services.
- Jim Frey – Board Member
  - Jim finished up his final term of service as a board member earlier this year.
  - Jim was a wonderful asset and a great friend to our organization.

#### **Gertrude Jekyll Garden Report (Eileen Denver – via Zoom and Phone)**

- The team of garden volunteers loves restoring the garden and continues to come and work on it.
- Garden Leadership: Eileen Denver, Deb Soresino, and Priscilla Price

- Garden volunteers work on Monday and Tuesday mornings and some other days as well.
- They start around 7:00-8:00 AM.
- Still River Gardens owners Lori and Jeremy Stickney continue to guide the garden volunteers in the garden restoration project.
- Garden work last summer was especially tricky due to the roof construction project as well as the lumber and other supplies stored near the house and garden.
- The garden was watered with hoses due to the drought.
- Even with the drought, the weeds continued to grow.
- The garden looks great. The plants are beginning to fill out.
- The garden continues to attract visitors.
- Garden volunteers love giving tours. They enjoy sharing what they've learned about garden design. They also enjoy using the garden to connect the community to the Glebe House and the garden.
- Thank you to Bob Bouclier for creating a new, separate room and entrance in the back of the garage for gardening equipment and supplies.

#### **Registrar – Collections Report**

- The Museum applied for a Collections Assessment Grant from Conservation ConneCTion and, subsequently, received the grant.
  - Barbara Bradbury-Pape, an Independent Museum Curator, came for a site visit.
  - The final report provides recommendations for collections care and storage. This information can be used when applying for grants in the future.
- A 19th-century Egg Basket was donated to the Museum Collection by Sandy Carlson. This basket was handed down through her family over the years. She wanted the basket in a place for posterity. Prior to the donation, there were no egg baskets in the Museum Collection.
- Sandy Carlson also donated several other baskets that contain handmade lace pieces made by her great-grandmother. The lace pieces show samples of embroidery that everyone would have learned. Sandy wanted them as part of the education program for both children and adults.
- LoriAnn continued to upload the photography and data entry.
- Lois continued to transcribe handwritten information.
- The Collective Access System currently has 161 objects and 467 object representations.
- Lois continues to clean the museum and maintain all of the original records for the Collection.

#### **Property Report**

- Property Committee Members: Hugh Sullivan (Chair), Carter Booth, Guy Gabrielson, and Lois Zane

- The committee is grateful for the transfer of the Glebe House and its land, as well as the Triangle Property, to the Seabury Society for the Preservation of the Glebe House, Inc.
- Thanks go to Reverend Tuesday Rupp, Bishop Jeffrey Mello, and Bradford Babbitt for facilitating and approving this transfer.
- Many things were done for the property in 2024.
  - Fall and spring clean-up
  - Lawn repair
  - Mowing
  - Garden shed improvements
  - Organization of the garden shed
  - Roof replacement
  - Burlap garden protection for the winter
    - The Garden Committee learned from Bob how to put the burlap on the shrubs so that it would not sag. The burlap keeps the deer at bay.
    - There is netting on the inside of plants that might be eaten by the deer.
  - Water was pumped out of the basement by Guy and LoriAnn. A pipe in the basement was plugged up by Guy, thus ending the problem of water getting into the basement.
- Thank you to O&G Industries for the crushed stone for the driveway.
- The Triangle Property and East Field were taken care of by an anonymous supporter and his helpers. The area is tidy and receives lots of compliments.
- Thank you to everyone who helped with the property.

    - Hydar did an excellent job on the roof.
    - Fred from Hydar Construction did not charge us for his personal services. He just charged for his workers' time, but not when he came to do things. Thank you, Fred.

## **President's Annual Report 2025**

The most fitting way in which to begin this Annual Report is with the sentiment, "Cheers to 100 Years". 2025 will long be remembered as the historic 100 year anniversary of the Glebe House Museum. The organization has achieved a full century of fulfilling its mission to provide outstanding and engaging educational and cultural opportunities, lectures, tours, and special events for visitors of all ages. The Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden sit firmly poised to begin a new century with sustained vigor and prominence in the community.

Of the many significant achievements in 2025, most noteworthy is the highly successful "Cheers to 100 Years" fundraiser on June 27th at Aria of Prospect. Years of planning and sustained effort by the event's committee comprised of Director LoriAnn Witte, Acting Board President Mindy Belcher, board members Joanne Bauer and Carol Ziske, along with Eric Groody and Janet Serra, culminated in a festive and high profile 1920's themed celebration. Guests delighted in wonderful food, a signature cocktail dubbed the flapper's fancy, and lively music provided by the Harold Zinno orchestra. The well attended celebration included a wide range of guests from the community, and we were especially pleased that the Rt. Reverend Jeffrey W. Mello was in attendance. This high profile event continued to raise awareness of the Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden, garnering future support ( be it financial, volunteer, membership or visitors) for the organization.

2025 ended on a strong note with regard to the organization's budget numbers. Notable increases were seen in income line items during 2024, even surpassing budget predictions. Healthy gains in membership, visitor numbers, and donations (both restricted and unrestricted) were achieved.

Educational opportunities for visitors of all ages were steadily offered throughout 2025. Director LoriAnn Witte was assisted by Julie Gilligan in the planning and implementing of the summer experience for children, as well as the Marshall after school program. We are extremely grateful to Julie for giving her time and expertise to assist with the educational aspect of the organization, in addition to her much appreciated role of recording minutes for organizational meetings. Home school group tours, Home school Day and Region 14 5th grade history day were all well attended this year. A variety of adult educational programs were also offered, which included a cast iron cooking workshop and a colonial herb lecture and workshop with Dr. Zamperone. We are grateful to Director LoriAnn Witte for continuing to adapt existing programs as well as procure new and engaging learning opportunities for visitors.

Autumn was once again a busy season for the Glebe House Museum. In the effort to keep the highly popular All Hollows Eve vibrant and appealing, volunteers spent many hours brainstorming ideas which eventually culminated in a fresh format for the event. Alterations to the event's schedule and location to include historic homes in the Hollow, as well as the addition of new characters, were all well received by visitors. This event continues to be a highly profitable fundraiser and would not be possible without the

legion of volunteers necessary for its production. Likewise, the "Witches of Woodbury" production, which has grown to become a crowd pleaser, was moved to the old town hall for its two performances in early October.

The property Committee comprised of Carter Booth, Guy Gabrielson, Hugh Sullivan and Lois Zane continued its ongoing dedication to overseeing the maintenance and preservation of the building and grounds. This committee is of the utmost importance, and the organization is extremely grateful for the expertise, time and care these members contribute to ensure the well being of the property. Special thanks to volunteer Bob Bouclier for the many "handy" jobs he so often takes on. As always, we are grateful to our anonymous supporter who continues to provide care and maintenance of the triangle and east field properties.

The Gertrude Jekyll Garden continued to grow and bloom during the fourth year of the garden restoration project. We are ever grateful to Eileen Denver, Priscilla Price and Deb Soresino for their continued devotion to the historic garden as well as overseeing the garden volunteers. Special thanks to board member, Priscilla Price, for acting as board liaison to the garden committee.

The Friends of the Glebe House are an integral part of the organization whose dedicated volunteers make it possible for the Glebe house Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden to fulfill its mission. The vital staffing and support which they provide are imperative for the success of the organization, and the unique skills each volunteer brings to the museum and garden are gifts for which the board and director are extremely appreciative.

Lois Zane, Registrar of Museum Collections, continues to be a devoted source of knowledge, care and commitment. We are enormously grateful to Lois for the role she takes on for the organization.

The board remains truly grateful for the exceptional work of Director, Lori Ann Witte. LoriAnn's work ethic and devotion are evident daily, whether in the long days she puts in on site, or by acting as an ambassador for the organization within the community. LoriAnn's steadfast performance of her many duties is recognized by the board and is evident in the enduring quality of the the organization and what it provides to the community.

With sincere gratitude, we thank all who contribute to the Glebe House Museum and Gertrude Jekyll Garden. ## **Friends of the Glebe Report – 2025**

The Friends of the Glebe is made up of volunteers who are interested in maintaining the Glebe House Museum as well as the Gertrude Jekyll Garden. Meeting every month from April until December, the volunteers put their efforts to good use in a variety of different ways.

In 2025, volunteers participated in a meet-and-greet program to recruit new volunteers. Volunteers later participated in a training program that focused on the history of the house. The volunteers were also trained in the operation of the museum gift shop.

In addition, volunteers helped out in 2025 as docents, shopkeepers, and gardeners. They also helped in planning and carrying out special events such as 5<sup>th</sup> Grade History Day, All Hollow's Eve, and the Woodbury Christmas Festival. This year, the Glebe House was included on the Woodbury Woman's Club House Tour, and volunteers participated in this event as well.

The Friends of the Glebe volunteers decorated the house and the gift shop for special occasions. They helped with the Cheers to 100 Years! gala in June. In addition, they helped to set up and run the Glebe House booth at the Earth Day Festival and the Fall Festival.

In 2025, volunteers assisted with many of the Glebe House education programs. Volunteers helped plan and implement Home School Day, 5<sup>th</sup> Grade History Day, and the Marshall Children after school program. Volunteers helped with the summer camp program as well.

- Work with Still River Gardens to replace plants and shrubs that did not survive 2023 - 2026
- Work with Still River Gardens to create document outlining long term care instructions for all plants
- Work with Still River Gardens to continue garden restoration around the Museum and in the allee - timing dependent on work to be done on the Museum
- Solicit assistance from local businesses in order to repair or replace garden tools, hoses, wheelbarrows and carts
- Work on developing a guide to the garden
- Winter prep ( netting, burlap, boughs and *Wilt Pruf*) This may require purchase of new burlap and netting.
